ZOHER GHOGAWALA, MD, FACS

Chair, Department of Neurosurgery Co-Director, Comparative Effectiveness Research Institute

Zoher Ghogawala, MD, FACS serves as the Charles A. Fager Chair of Neurosurgery at Lahey Clinic. He is active in the surgical treatment of patients with disorders of the spine, carotid vascular disease and pituitary brain tumors. His research focuses on comparative effectiveness and neurosurgical outcomes, exploring the effectiveness, benefits and sometimes harmful results of different treatment options.

As the co-director of Lahey Clinic's Comparative Effectiveness Research Institute, Dr. Ghogawala will lead an initiative to improve quality of care by measuring spinal fusion surgery outcomes, as well as an initiative involving the creation of a statewide spine registry housed at Lahey Clinic.

Previously at Yale New Haven Hospital and Greenwich Hospital in Greenwich, Conn., Dr. Ghogawala founded and directed the Wallace Clinical Trials Center, which measures patients' quality of life after surgery. He is the principal investigator for several national, externally funded clinical trials, including the SLIP, a randomized clinical trial that compared fusion versus no fusion following spinal decompression, and CSM, a study to determine the optimal surgical approach for patients with multilevel cervical spondylotic myelopathy.

Dr. Ghogawala recently edited and published a textbook entitled, *The Evidence for Neurosurgery*. He serves on the Executive Committee for the Congress of Neurological Surgeons as well as the AANS/CNS Joint Section on Disorders of the Spine and Peripheral Nerves. Dr. Ghogawala is also on the Board of Directors of the Collaborative Spine Research Foundation, the North American Spine Society (NASS), and the Neuropoint Alliance. Dr. Ghogawala completed his undergraduate degree at Harvard University, and graduated from Harvard Medical School with high honors in 1991. He completed his residency training in neurological surgery at Massachusetts General Hospital.



Francis Howard Lahey, MD, (1880–1953) was born in Haverhill, Mass., and received his MD from Harvard Medical School in 1904. Regarded as one of America's greatest teachers of surgery, Dr. Lahey pioneered in New England the concept of a multispecialty group practice using a team approach of coordinated medical care.

After several years on the staffs of Harvard and Tufts Medical Schools, he joined the Army Medical Corps during World War I and became Chief of Surgery at Evacuation Hospital No. 30 in France. This experience taught him the value of the team approach to the patient — the principle upon which he found Lahey Clinic. Throughout his career, Dr. Lahey held many influential leadership positions, including president of the American Medical Society, New England Surgical Society, American Surgical Society, and International Society of Surgeons.
