Training Staff to Become Exceptional Nurses

Delivering Extraordinary Care

In just over three years, Lahey’s Women’s Leadership Council (WLC) has raised more than \$450,000 for the Clinic’s nursing student stipend program, a model philanthropic effort created in response to the nation’s nursing shortage. Through a collaborative partnership with Middlesex Community College, Lahey provides access to a part-time associate of science in nursing program designed to enable qualified Clinic staff members in non-nursing roles to make the transition into nursing.

“The WLC selected the nursing student stipend program as a fund-raising priority for four compelling reasons,” explains Carolyn Ain, chair of the WLC fund-raising committee. “Training existing staff to become professional nurses addresses the national nursing shortage, while it empowers individuals to advance themselves. The program also assures Lahey a supply of proven employees, and enables the Clinic’s patients to continue to receive the best nursing care possible.”

For Kathleen Jose, M.S.N., R.N., chief nursing officer, the WLC’s generosity has far-reaching consequences. “Words can not begin to express my gratitude to the WLC members for directing their philanthropic efforts to support the nursing student stipend program. It is with their support that we were able to reach out to more than 175 Lahey patients and friends to fund stipends enabling 33 Lahey Clinic colleagues to become professional nurses.”

WLC donor Liz Gilroy adds that the program provides an opportunity for fulfilling professional aspirations that once seemed unobtainable. “The student stipend program offers a man or woman the choice of a new career and life that they could not have before. I admire someone with that kind of drive—he or she deserves all the help possible.”
