## Dealing with Ethical Dilemmas

**A** woman who had stabbed herself in the neck in a suicide attempt was brought to the emergency department. Her family said she was depressed and didn't want to live anymore. They demanded that all treatment be stopped. Doctors, not knowing whether the patient truly wished to die or was unduly influenced by her depression, were conflicted about what to do.

Refusal of treatment is just one of the many ethical dilemmas faced by doctors everyday. What ought to be done and what's "right" are not always clear when dealing with such complex issues as "do not resuscitate" orders, advance directives and physician-assisted suicide. With such medical advances as genetic testing, in vitro fertilization and cloning, good judgment is not always intuitive.

Rooted in ancient philosophy and religion, modern bioethics began about 40 years ago with the introduction of the doctrine of informed consent and has grown to include all aspects of the physician/patient relationship. Today, the role of the medical ethicist is to help identify, analyze and resolve ethical questions or dilemmas

that arise in patient care.

"Being a hematologist and oncologist, I've encountered a lot of ethical issues over the years," says David Steinberg, MD, a member of Lahey Clinic's staff for 27 years. The lack of a formal ethics program to help physicians deal with such clinical controversies prompted Steinberg to found the Clinic's Section of Medical Ethics in 1991.

Today, the 20-plus member Medical Ethics Section is a multidisciplinary group composed of physicians, medical residents, nurses, a social worker, chaplain, lawyer and community representative. "This allows us to view ethical dilemmas from many different perspec-

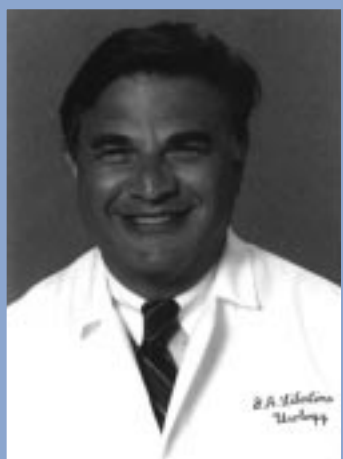

tives to try to come up with the best answer," says Steinberg.

The Medical Ethics Section provides consultations upon request for health care providers, patients or relatives of patients facing difficult ethical dilemmas. A three- or four-person subcommittee meets with the concerned parties to assist in the resolution of the

## Libertino To Step Down

**J**ohn A. Libertino, MD, chief executive officer and chairman of the Board of Governors, has announced that he will leave those posts in January to pursue his clinical work full time. A practicing urologist, Libertino says he decided not to seek re-election so he could spend more time with his family and patients.

"My heart, after 28 years at Lahey, is with my patients," he told the *Boston Globe*. "I want to devote all my time to surgery and to leading various medical research programs currently underway at Lahey Clinic."

Libertino is a noted expert in urinary bladder reconstruction, renal artery bypass surgery and kidney salvage. He will continue as chairman of the Clinic's Department of Urology.

The Board of Trustees has appointed a search committee to find a new chief executive officer. ■

dilemma. Once a month the whole group assembles to review the consultations retrospectively.

The Section of Medical Ethics also helps the Clinic write policies to ensure a uniform and appropriate approach to patient cases. Among these are policies concerning withholding and withdrawing treatment, refusal of blood transfusions, advance directives and testing for cancer susceptibility.

Another activity of the Section is the Medical Ethics Lecture Series. Launched in 1991, the lecture series has been a success from the start, attracting large audiences, which include health care providers, administrators and the general public.

"We have been able to have very good speakers by drawing on the talent in the Boston area," says Steinberg. "I've also worked hard to obtain financial support for the program."

The series brings lawyers, scientists, physicians and nurses to the Clinic eight times a year to address a wide variety of timely topics. Prominent speakers have included

Edmund Pellegrino of the John F. Kennedy Institute of Ethics; Daniel Callahan, founder and director of the Hastings Center, and Arthur Caplan, head of the Center for Bioethics at the University of Pennsylvania.

Another educational function of the Section is the *Lahey Clinic Medical Ethics Newsletter*, which features columns by nationally and internationally known experts in the field. The editorial board includes Lahey Clinic neurologists Paul Gross, MD, and James Russell, DO. Managing editor is Patricia Busacker of Lahey's Public Affairs Department.

The newsletter has a total circulation of about 25,000. In addition to alumni, it is distributed to physicians and health care workers throughout the Lahey Clinic network, members of the Massachusetts Medical Society and students at Dartmouth, Tufts and Harvard Medical Schools. The newsletter is also sent to hundreds of people across the country who have requested copies.

"Our goal is to bring information on ethics and values to people in health care who don't otherwise have the time to read the ethics literature," says Steinberg.

The Section also maintains a medical ethics library, located within the Cattell Library, which includes up-to-date ethics journals, extensive encyclopedias and many books on a variety of ethical subjects. The collection contains videotapes of the medical ethics lectures as well.

In addition to the lectures and newsletters, residents can participate in

a special educational program that gives them the opportunity to present patient cases and discuss specific topics. This type of training helps them learn how to handle particular ethical problems.

Another major activity sponsored by the Section of Medical Ethics is the Lahey Clinic Patient Care Awards. These annual awards honor two individuals, nominated by their peers, "who best combine the art and science of their profession and the human values of caring, empathy and effective communication." Each award winner receives a plaque and \$500.

"The patient care awards," says Steinberg, "are given to sustain the traditional values of Lahey Clinic."

This year's physician award, presented in June, went to ophthalmologist Joseph H. Bowlds, MD. In addition to providing outstanding eye care, he serves as the medical director of Lahey Clinic Northshore and is a member of Lahey Clinic's Board of Governors. Colleagues cited Bowlds' for his dedication, compassion and gentle manner.

Past recipients of the physician award include: Drs. H. Stephen Kott of the Department of Neurology, Burton G. Mandel of the Section of General Internal Medicine, Alan H. Nauss of the Department of Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine, David J. Bryan of the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery and the late Donald J. Breslin, of the Department of Vascular Medicine.

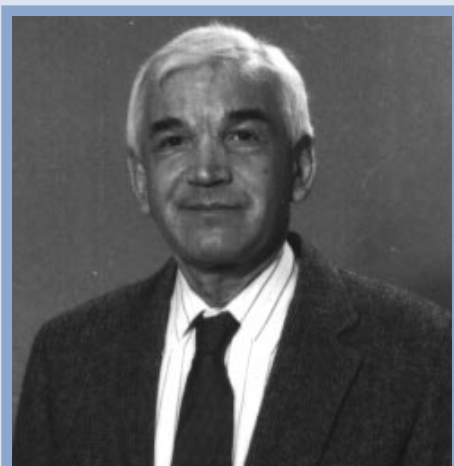

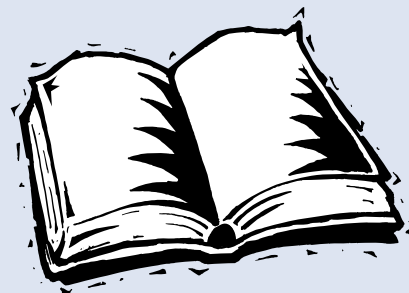
